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#### MUHAS CELEBRATES THE 12TH GRADUATION CEREMONY

he Chancellor of Muhimbili University of Health and Allied Sciences (MUHAS), H.E. Alhaji Dr. Ali Hassan Mwinyi conferred degrees and diplomas to 1,124 graduands at the 12<sup>th</sup> MUHAS Graduation Ceremony since it became a fully fledged University in 2007.

In this event 387 graduands were conferred diplomas and advanced diplomas, 477 were conferred first degrees and 241 master degrees in different fields of health and allied sciences. In addition, there were 15 graduates of Master of Science super specialties and 4 graduands who were conferred doctor of philosophy (PhD) degree.

Speaking during this ceremony, the Chairperson of the MUHAS Council, Ms Mariam Mwaffisi congratulated all graduates for this accomplishment and also thanked the Government of the United Republic of Tanzania through the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology for the continued support to MUHAS that has enabled smooth accomplishment of its tasks. Ms Mwaffisi said this celebration is the evidence of the success of the implementation of its tasks.

Moreover, the MUHAS Vice Chancellor, Prof. Andrea Pembe spoke about the need of developing the Mloganzila land to be able to increase the number of students enrolled and therefore increase the number of human resources produced for the health sector in the country.

Prof. Pembe emphasized that the number of applicants who have met the criteria to be enrolled at MUHAS keeps on increasing yearly. However, a very small percentage of these students is selected to join the University due to inadequate space and facilities for teaching and learning.

In further explaining the issue, the Vice Chancellor gave an example of the admission process this year where out of 2,837 applicants who were qualified to join the Doctor of Medicine (MD) programme at MUHAS only 230 were

selected, which is the maximum number that the University can enroll in this programme in relation to the available teaching infrastructure.

Prof. Pembe thanked the government through the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology for funding the construction of phase 1 of academic and support facilities at Mloganzila campus which is done by the Tanzania Building Agency (TBA). However, the Vice Chancellor requested to increase the speed of construction to enable the University to double students' intake for the academic year 2019/20.

The 12<sup>th</sup> MUHAS Graduation Ceremony took place on 1<sup>st</sup> of December 2018 at the Muhimbili Campus and among the dignitaries who attended was the Deputy Permanent Secretary Education for the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology, Dr. Ave Maria Semakafu. The Graduation Ceremony was preceded by the Prize Giving Ceremony for the Academic Year 2017/2018 on the Friday, 30<sup>th</sup> November, 2018, and Convocation and Annual General Meeting on Thursday, 29<sup>th</sup> November, 2018.

### THE PERMANENT SECRETARY FOR HEALTH OFFICIATES PRE HOSPITAL CARE PROVIDERS' TRAINING

he Permanent Secretary Ministry of Health, Community Development, Gender, Elderly and Children, Dr. Ulisubisya Mpoki commended the efforts made towards having different interventions to reduce the number of accidents as well as the effects that are caused by these accidents on the roads.

Dr. Mpoki was speaking during the official opening of Pre Hospital Care Providers' Training conducted at MUHAS recently. He further commented that MUHAS is an appropriate place to conduct these kind of trainings due to their experience and expertise in health training in the country.

Speaking about the importance of different interventions to reduce the number of accidents, the Permanent

Secretary explained that this country has an expansive road network that is used by the majority of the people to meet their travel and transportation needs since the economy does not allow them to use air transport.

He further said that many accidents occur when these roads are not properly used or when people who are otherwise expected to be responsible behave carelessly. Therefore, he said "When we invest in this intervention we invest in the place where we will be able to touch many people".

Speaking earlier, the Deputy Vice Chancellor, Academic, Research and Consultancy Prof. Appolinary Kamuhabwa thanked the Ministry of Health, Community Development, Gender, Elderly and Children for giving MUHAS the opportunity of training these important specialists

thus contribute directly in ensuring that the country has a proper system of treating injured patients as well as patients with different emergencies.

The DVC-ARC said, MUHAS has prepared five short course curricula specifically for training specialists who will provide services in different categories of care provision for emergency patients and accident victims. Prof. Kamuhabwa further mentioned the five training courses as basic ambulance providers training, basic ambulance attendant training, medical call centre dispatcher training, community first aid training and training of trainers.

In the first phase of these trainings, a total of 25 people from different parts of the country received training. This includes professionals

from Kimara Health Center, Tumbi Referral Hospital, Chalinze Health Centre, Morogoro Regional Hospital, Fulwe-Mikese Dispensary, St Kizito-Mikumi Hospital in Morogoro, Ruaha Dispensary, Temeke Hospital, Ilala Hospital, Kinondoni Hospital, Kigamboni Hospital and from the Tanzanian People Defense Force.

During this ceremony the Permanent Secretary for Health also inaugurated a book titled 'Basic Ambulance Provider' written to complement the curricular of the pre hospital care providers and thus ensure high quality training.

In giving the vote of thanks to the Permanent Secretary for officiating the trainings, the Course Director and Head of Department of Emergency Medicine at MUHAS, Dr. Hendry Sawe said that in preparation of the curricular and the trainings, his department worked closely with

the Ministry of Health, Community Development, Gender, Elderly and Children, Emergency Medicine Association of Tanzania, the Emergency Medicine Department of Muhimbili National Hospital, the Red Cross Society and partners from US (Carolinas Medical Centre) and Australia (The Alfred Health). He also thanked the World Bank for funding the trainings.

The Ambassador was speaking during his visit to MUHAS on the 27<sup>th</sup> November, 2018 as part of the efforts to strengthen the France - Tanzania collaboration in Health, Academia, Research and Training in Africa.

To enhance collaboration with France and other EU partners, H. E. Frédéric Clavier advised MUHAS to have a long-term strategy of 5 to 10 years with clear priority areas to be able to put maximum efforts on them. The Ambassador further offered five scholarships in different programmes to MUHAS.

In welcoming the Ambassador and his delegation to MUHAS, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Andrea Pembe said that MUHAS has a range of researches that are ongoing and are coordinated by the Directorate of Research and Publication. He further informed them that currently there are more than 100 ongoing research projects which are done by different groups of researchers.

The Ambassador and his delegation also got an opportunity to listen to highlights from few research projects at MUHAS including a presentation from Dr. Vera Ngowi from the Department of Environmental and Occupational Health who gave a presentation on Exploring the Detrimental Health effects of Pesticides in Africa and a presentation on Planning for Bone Marrow Transplant Services in Tanzania from the Department of Haematology and Blood Transfusion that was given by Dr. Janeth Mtenga.

Moreover, the Department of Epidemiology and Biostatics gave a presentation on the Dar es Salaam Health and Demographic Surveillance System which was done by Dr. Germana Leyna and a presentation on Community Health Workers Learning Agenda — Towards the Development of a Community Health Worker Cadre in Tanzania, presented Dr. Rose Mpembeni.

Vice Chancellor - Academic, Research and Consultancy, the Director of Undergraduate Education, Dr. Erasto Mbugi said that Examination irregularity carries a serious punishment, often discontinuation from studies. He further said that cheating in examinations and plagiarism is not acceptable at this level of training especially in professions where trainees are expected to acquire reliable and ethically sound competencies.

Dr. Mbugi advised the new students to have a completely mindset transition from High School to University teaching and learning. "You need to exercise control of your own education, know and make use of your academic staff, be assertive, plan and control your time, set goals and aim and strive for excellence, he added.

## PROF. MATUJA DELIVERS PROFESSORIAL LECTURE ON EPILEPSY IN TANZANIA

UHAS Professor of Neurology, Prof. William Matuja delivered a Professorial Lecture at the Muhimbili Campus on "How can we make a Difference in People Living with Epilepsy in Tanzania".

In this event, the Deputy Vice Chancellor Academic, Research and Consultancy (DVC-ARC), Prof. Appolinary Kamuhabwa congratulated Prof. Matuja for being able to achieve this highest honour in academia in delivering a Professorial Lecture.

In recognizing Prof. Matuja's achievement in his field, the DVC-ARC said that Prof. Matuja is a coordinator of the Neurology Unit at Muhimbili University of Health and Allied Sciences (MUHAS) and a seasoned researcher who has over 60 papers in peer-reviewed journals. He has a wide experience in neurology especially in epilepsy, headaches, and stroke, elderly and neurologically related mental health issues.

The Chairman of the Professorial Lecture, Prof. Gad Kilonzo mentioned some of Prof. Matuja's accomplishment in the area of epilepsy and said that he

has done a lot including epidemiology, KAP studies, causes leading to Nodding Syndrome (formerly head nodding). "He is the President of Tanzania Epilepsy Association since 1999 and under his leadership the association has managed to solicit funds for 3 large research projects in the country on epilepsy", Prof. Kilonzo added.

In delivering his Professorial Lecture, Prof. Matuja said epilepsy is a common chronic brain disease, about 60 million people worldwide with 34-76 affected per 100,000 new cases being added annually. In Tanzania, Prof. Matuja said there are about 1,000,000 people living with epilepsy with 70-73 affected per 100,000 new cases being added annually.

"Matched for age patients with epilepsy in Tanzania have six times high mortality rate than general population", Prof. Matuja said. He further said over 60% of deaths are due to epilepsy related (directly or indirectly) complications.

Among the things that can be done to reduce high prevalence of epilepsy in Tanzania Prof. Matuja said is prevention of factors that are preventable including good antenatal care, early diagnosis and treatment of children with high temperature that causes brain fever, proper use of latrines, washing hands and eating well cooked pork meat.

Prof. Matuja also stressed the importance of training of health workers on causes, prevention, early diagnosis and appropriate treatment of people with epilepsy.

#### MUHAS AWARDS 155 PRIZES TO THE BEST STUDENTS FOR ACADEMIC YEAR 2017/2018

UHAS awarded 155 prizes to 111 best students from the five schools (Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy, Nursing, and Public Health and Social Sciences) and the two Institutes (Traditional Medicine and Allied Health Sciences) in the Prize Giving Ceremony for the academic year 2017/2018 on the eve of the 12th MUHAS Graduation Ceremony.

Addressingthe participants of this event, the Deputy Vice Chancellor, Academic, Research and Consultancy (DVC-ARC) Prof. Appolinary Kamuhabwa said out of these 155 prizes, 102 prizes will be awarded to undergraduate students and 53 to postgraduates.

Prof. Kamuhabwa further elaborated that the 102 prizes for undergraduate students were won by 67 students (including 44 male and 23 female students). The School of Pharmacy continued to lead in the number of prizes, for the past seven years consecutively, with 26 prizes this year.

The numbers of prizes won in the other Schools/Institutes included; 19 prizes for the Institute of Allied Health Science, 19 prizes for the School of Dentistry, 13 prizes for the School of Public Health and Social Sciences, 13 prizes for the School of Nursing and 12 prizes for the School of Medicine.

The DVC-ARC further said that in overall, 65.6% of the undergraduate degree and diploma prize winners in the academic year 2017/2018 were won by male students. However, it was a female student, Wema Kibanga, who performed exceptionally well and scooped the highest number of prizes (nine) in this ceremony.

For Postgraduate students, Prof. Kamuhabwa said 53 prizes were won by 44 students including 14 (31.8%) female and 30 (68%) male students. However, there were 14 Postgraduate

prizes which did not get eligible winners for the academic year 2017/2018.

In this ceremony, the DVC-ARC also thanked individuals and organizations who have donated different prizes for the success of this ceremony. He also challenged other individuals and organizations both in public and private sectors, to support such kind of activities that promotes teaching and learning and improve the quality of academic programmes because the ultimate beneficiary of our products is both the public and private institutions.

The half day symposium which had the theme "Misuse of antibiotics puts us all at risk: think twice; seek advice" was graced by Director of preventive Service -MoHCDGEC - Dr. Subi as Guest of honor.

The MUHAS Deputy Vice Chancellor -Academic, Research and Consultancy, Prof A. Kamuhabwa moderated the panelists that included; Ms. Rose Shija who is a Pharmacist and the WHO National Pharmaceutical Adviser in the United Republic of Tanzania since 2002 as well as Mr. Fasina Folorunso -an infectious disease epidemiologist and current FAO Programme Team Leader in

#### STRENGHTENING THE MUHAS INSTITUTIONAL REVIEW BOARD

he Directorate of Research and Publication, with support from the Dartmouth MUHAS Research Ethics Training (DMRET) Program and the Department of Bioethics and Health Professionalism at MUHAS held a series of mini workshops from 7-8th November 2018 aimed at strengthening the Institutional Review Board (IRB).

Dr. Elizabeth Bankert, with 20+ years' experience on IRB and author of numerous books on institutional review board was the guest speaker on day one of the mini workshops focusing on the MUHAS Institutional review board. She talked about the new regulations for IRBs, criteria for waiver, exemption and expedited review. Ms. Sia Malekia from the National Medical Institute of Research in Tanzania and MUHAS Masters of Bioethics (MBE)'s alumni spoke candidly about the Tanzanian regulations, which IRB members had keen interest on. Members also had the opportunity to discuss a real case study from the MUHAS IRB to ponder and consider the various ethical principles that can be used in granting ethical clearance.

The second day concentrated on Informed consent in research.

This was led by Dr. Jon Merz, who is a resident expert in informed consent and has been involved as an expert witness in medical judicial cases. Participants got to have a teach- back session to understand how best informed consent can be participatory.

The Tanzanian team led by Head of Department of Bioethics and Health Professionalism; Dr. Renatha Joseph also presented on the Tanzania experience in informed consent in relation to cultural diversity and challenges posed by western concepts of informed consent.

The Director of Research and Publication was grateful to the facilitators, **DMRET** and Department for the support of the workshop and the participants for their keen interest and participation.

#### **ADOLESCENT WELLNESS VISIT DISSEMINATION MEETING**

n 18th October 2018 Muhimbili University of Health and Allied Sciences (MUHAS) under department of Psychiatry and Mental Health in collaboration with Duke Global Health Institute, Duke University USA had a dissemination meeting for Pilot Study on Adolescent Wellness Visits (AWV). The overall objective of the study was to assess the feasibility and acceptability of implementing Adolescent Wellness Visits (AWVs) in two government primary schools (Mwambao in Bagamoyo and Ununio in Dar es Salaam) at nearby public health facilities (Bagamoyo District Hospital and Ununio Dispensary).

AWVs was designed to address preventative sexual and reproductive health (SRH) needs but incorporates non-SRH health concerns (nutrition, vision, dental, mental health) for broader appeal and applicability for all adolescents. The goal was for adolescents to experience a positive, prevention-focused clinical encounter that influences future HIV Testing and Counselling.

154 (102 in Dar, 52 in Bagamoyo) Standard 7 students participated in a surveys and medical record reviews. 55 key informant interviews (KIIs) with adolescents, parents, school staff, health providers, and government officials; preand post-intervention were carried out.

This dissemination meeting involved researchers, officials from health sectors to include District Medical Officers, District AIDS Coordinator, District Dental Focal Person, District Nutrition Focal Person, District Education Officer, School health coordinator, teachers, healthcare providers, parents and adolescents. The guest of honor was Dr. Grace Maghembe Dar es Salaam Reginal Medical Officer. The key findings from this study were shared as shown in the table below

Adolescent Wellness Visits were feasible and highly acceptable to communities. While there were some concerns noted (logistics of visits during school hours, how to pay for referred follow-up services), overall, communities were happy with the results and process. The strong hesitancy among providers for implementing HTC despite

supportive Tanzanian health policies was unforeseen. More guidelines on HIV risk assessment and ethics of providing requested services needed.

After we shared the key findings this meeting offered an opportunity for

various experts and stakeholders to discuss policy and program implications for adolescent's health improvement efforts in Tanzania arising from the study findings. Future R01 plans: test if AWV associated with increased HTC uptake during older adolescence.

Under this initiative, early to mid-career scientists from different African countries are supported to establish themselves in research areas that address Africa most pressing NCD challenges.

#### MUHAS AWARDED NORWEGIAN RESEARCH COUNCIL GRANT TO ADDRESS THE HIV EPIDEMIC IN TANZANIA

uhimbili University of Health and Allied Sciences (MUHAS) in collaboration with the University of Oslo (UiO), Norway have been awarded a total of NOK 17,199,000.00 (Equivalent to US\$ 2,097,439.00) by the Norwegian Research Council as part of it is Global Health and Vaccination (GLOBVAC) initiative.

The awarded grant will implement a project titled: "PREPTA-Pragmatic Trial for HIV Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis Roll-Out in Tanzania" for the period 2019-2022. Prof. Elia John Mmbaga from MUHAS and Prof. Kare Moen from UiO will lead PEPTA to test innovative approaches including e-platform to enhance the delivery and uptake of Truvada® for HIV Pre-exposure prophylaxis among populations at high risk of HIV infection in Dar es salaam and Tanga.

The project will employ a stepwise phased approach which will include initial formative assessment followed by intervention mapping and culminate in a Pragmatic Quasi-Experimental study. The ultimate goal of PREPTA is to contribute into the government efforts to lower the HIV transmission rates among key population and achieve the 90-90-90 goal.

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
